What I had brought back from Stirling 32 years ago, besides my degree and a Scottish accent, was motivation for innovation that still works. Unfortunately there has not been too much fish work in our labs since 1980.

In the 1990s I set up automated routine ELISA facilities with online data transfer to cope with masses of blood samples coming in due to EU eradication schemes against swine fever and Aujeszky's disease. Monitoring of bulk milk samples to ensure freedom from Bovine Leucosis and Brucellosis also had to be set up.



Dr Krishen Rana

Dr Krishen Rana of the Institute of Aquaculture has been appointed Professor Extraordinary in Aquaculture at the Department

of Genetics, Stellenbosch University, South Africa from July 2006 to June 2009. The appointment is in recognition of his specialised expertise and will enable him to contribute to the academic programmes at Stellenbosch.

From the year 2000 I set up a diagnostic PCR lab from scratch, initially with only one part-time technician that soon had to cope with more than 10,000 tests per year. The highlight came last spring, as we had to examine 3,700 dead wild and domestic birds for Avian Influenza. There were days when up to 200 birds were delivered to the post mortem room. Setting up real-time-PCR for VHS, IHN and KHV brought me back to the fish field. You see, despite my administrative
